In 1926, the Willits Development Association came up with the idea of sponsoring a community activity to raise funds for the construction of a much-needed hospital. Through the efforts of many prominent citizens, including Dr. Raymond Babcock, Frank Taft, Judge E.M. Whitney, Judge Fred Foord, Deed Wimmer, Frank and Bill Whitney, Joe Quadrio, Edward Morris, Carl Edenfeldt, Allen Sacry and the American Legion Post, a plan was hatched, and the first

Coincidentally, at this same time, Frank R. Howard, the young son of Charles S. Howard, owner of Ridgewood Ranch and champion racehorse Seabiscuit, was injured in an automobile accident at the ranch. The boy's doctor, Dr. Babcock, approached Howard about erecting a hospital in Willits in memory of young Frank, who did not survive the fatal crash, Mr. Howard agreed and decided to build the Frank R. Howard Memorial Hospital shortly thereaf-

Willits Frontier Days Rodeo occurred in July

Even though the original idea of having a rodeo to fund construction of a hospital was no longer necessary, the American Legion decided to carry on with their plans for the event anyway.

The celebration was an instant success, and

the American Legion ran the show until 1932, when the Willits Volunteer Fire Department accepted the leadership role. Looking to the future, the fire department borrowed money to improve the rodeo grounds by having individual volunteer firefighters sign promissory notes.

The Willits Frontier Days Association was born and incorporated in 1950, when a group of local businessmen and ranchers took over the proverbial

"reins" of the event. The continuity of Willits Frontier Days has remained unbroken since

As a non-profit organization, Willits Frontier Days still operates as it did in the beginning, with no associated individual or organization getting any financial reward. Residents and clubs work together to put on the events and joining.





Remembering Ron Monhead

Ronald Clair Moorhead, 72, of Willits, peacefully passed away on Thursday. February 4 in the comfort of his home with his wife, Cathy, by his side.

Ron lived in Willits for 40 years, was a volunteer and board member of Willits Frontier Days, and participated in the Ukiah Gun Club, helped organize the annual Memorial Day Car Show, the Hometown Celebrations, and much

Much of his time was also spent at the Willits Chamber of Commerce, serving as the executive director, the president, and as a member of the board of directors for over 30 years.

The Willits Chamber of Commerce became the first chamber in the nation, under Ron's tutelage, to become

a member of the Business Alliance for Local Living Economies (BALLE) in 2006. Ron also worked with Ridgewood Ranch and the Mendocino County Museum to have the chamber promote the Seabiscuit legacy, helping organize walking tours, and co-hosting the west coast and hometown premieres of "Seabiscuit."

During his time working on the Seabiscuit project. Ron fell in love with the beauty of Ridgewood Ranch. So, it only made sense that years later, when he found the love of his life. Cathy Sanders, they would be married at this very ranch. Ron and Cathy were married in 2015 under a beautiful old-growth redwood in the company of beloved family and friends.






If the gates to the grounds are open, you can usually find him working around the yard, weedeating, building something or organizing. No project is too big or small!

He was a volunteer Fireman at Little Lake Fire Department for over 26 years, where he served as a Captain as well as association president for several years.


In the 80's he coached youth soccer. Instead of coaching the same age group every year, he enjoyed following the same group of kids as they progressed in age and skill level.



The California Cowboys Pro Rodeo Association is a group of top-ranked cowgirls and cowboys who participate on a circuit of professional-grade rodeos throughout the state.

The contestants participate in eight events - bareback, saddle bronc, team roping, calf roping, steer wrestling, breakaway roping, barrel racing and bull riding - hoping to win the coveted All-Around title. After the points from all the events are tallied, the cowgirl and cowboy with the highest cumulative scores win the title, a coordinating engraved buckle created at Outlaw Saddlery. a wad of cold hard cash, and bragging rights for the duration of

The livestock for the events, the bulls, broncs and horned-alike – 'rodeo stock' as they are referred to in the trade – are provided by Humboldt County's Lou Bugenig of West Coast Rodeos. Known throughout the state as a premiere stock contractor, West Coast bulls and broncs give the boys a challenge to hang on to, and the steer and calves try to give the ladies a run for their money.

In addition to the eight CCPRA Rodeo events, cowboys and cowgirls from Lake, Mendocino and Humboldt counties can compete in local team roping events as well. Trophy buckles, also engraved by Outlaw Saddlery, are awarded to the top-scoring Header and Heeler

The Jack Tharp Arena gets to serve a different use on Friday night, when the Truck and Tractor Pulls replace the bulls and broncs that usually inhabit the space.

Local boys and girls, and a roster of professional drivers who are a part of the MLM Motorsports crew, try their trucks and tractors against The Terminator, a weighted sled that is hooked to competitors' vehicles.

The drivers must begin from a parked position, be hooked to the sled, then methodically, or with much gusto, drag the sled down

the arena and hope to make it across the 300-foot-mark finish line.

The sled has an increasable weight that can be altered to allow different levels of resistance for each class of drivers.

Classes include: Super Street, Street Diesel, OMG Class, Stock Diesel, 4,500-pound, 5,500-pound, 7,200-pound, Pro Modified trucks, 5,800-pound tractors, Country Modified, 6,000-pound and 8,000-pound.

Awards are given, as are bragging rights, to those who are able to dominate The Terminator. Many drivers compete with MLM at their other events, and come back to Willits year after year for this fun event.







The strip of Main Street between Commercial Street and East Valley Street gets a holiday-themed makeover on the morning of July 4, as the annual parade kicks off and turns Main Street into a red, white and blue extravaganza.

Community members and visitors from all over the county and beyond line the sidewalks of historic downtown Willits to watch the glitter, horses, dancers, floats, balloons, gunfighters, bands, flags, tractors – and usually a surprise or two – march down Main Street.

Several entrants have made the parade an annual or generational tradition for their families – some riding since they were just little buckaroos, including members of the Persico families and many others.

Annual favorites include the Willits Frontier

Days Sweetheart contestants, the current Grand Marshal and Heritage Award winners, Roots of Motive Power antique logging equipment, Willits Horsemen's Association, Willits Police Department, Little Lake and Brooktrails Fire Departments, CalFire, as well as many other emergency personnel – with sirens and lights blazing, of course.

The announcer's stand, located at the corner of East Mendocino Avenue and Main Street, introduces each entry and provides information on each group or individual participant. It also serves as the stage for the winner of the National Anthem contest to sing at the opening of the parade. Though many viewers stake out seats in the coveted shady locations in the early hours of the morning, the parade starts at 11 a.m. and is free to attend.





October 2, 2021

After the official Willits Frontier Days and Fourth of July events are over, the Jack Tharp Arena quiets down for a few months, but when October rolls around, it livens up once again and plays host to the annual Ranch Rodeo

The Ranch Rodeo differs from the traditional rodeo events by offering teams of riders the chance to try their hands and hooves at more practical, working-ranch-lifestyle tasks like "ranch doctoring," "trailer loading," and "team sorting." 





The barn was removed and replaced with new offices that were to be built on the same location. The wood sat in the back of the Mendocino County Museum for a few years until Willits Frontier Days was approached about using the material.

Always happy to incorporate Willits' history into new projects and keep the old spirit of the town alive. Willits Frontier Days gladly accepted the wood. They knew just the use for it: a new margarita booth.

Planning began to create the new margarita booth and stock room the grounds were so in need of – and needed guickly! Fred Barry and Bruce Cartwright began the project right away NorCal Recycled Rock and Aggregates and a couple of their employees donated the flooring, and Bob Doty at Mendo Mill had the cedar laminate made for the center beam of the room. From there, the men started assembling the outside of the structure, all from Coleman Ranch wood. The inside features four original barn doors, too.
