


FREE FOOD!

There are many wonderful programs at Willits High School, including Academic Decathlon which is both mentally challenging as well as inclusive. Academic Decathlon (now referred to as U.S. Academic Decathlon "USAD") is "an association of state programs dedicated to promoting and rewarding interdisciplinary learning, teamwork and academic achievement among high school students."

The program is inclusive to students of all learning levels, even if you have a low GPA or have failed a class in the past, you can still compete in USAD with your team. The class studies a variety of subjects such as art, music, literature, mathematics, economics, social studies and science.



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

This homecoming our guys did their best and showed off their skills and played to the limit. It's not whether you win or lose that matters after all. It's how you play the game that counts!





HOW HIGH WILL THEY FLY?

A PHYSICS EXPERIMENT

In the Willits High School Physics class we just went through a lab in which we launched a marshmallow projectile at multiple angles to determine its maximum height. In the process, the first thing we did was create our catapult that we would be launching our marshmallow off of. We created the catapult using a pencil, spoon, rubber bands and a clip. After we created the catapult, we went into the auditorium and did a test run to see, on average, how high the marshmallow would go in order to make a more accurate hypothesis.

Once we came up with our hypothesis, we decided to start the lab to test our theory. We launched the marshmallow at different angle degrees to test which one would give us the maximum height of the projectile. To do the experiment completely, we had to record the time and the distance across the stage.

With the information that we acquired, we used the equations of a projectile to find out the missing components. We had to discover the initial velocity and use that in an equation to discover the vertical height in every degree.

With each degree, we did three attempts and we had to find the average of height and time of that degree so we could have more accurate answers for the vertical height and initial velocity. Although we did all the correct procedures for the experiment, all of the groups still had an amount of percent error. Which means that none of our hypotheses were completely correct, but a few were very close. We did this experiment to have a real-life visual of how high an object can go when launched at multiple angles, in order to relate it to the equations and facts the book had given us.

It's October 2018 and time for college-bound seniors (the class of 2019) to start their college applications. Start by scheduling a meeting with your high school counselor first. Most of the application deadlines this year are November 30; however, some scholarship application deadlines are November 1, so research due dates.

The entire college application process takes time and thoughtful reflection by parents and students. Communication with your high school counselor is essential. Seeking a high school counselor's advice and help, will reduce the stress and enable all to enjoy the process.

There are different terms used in the college application world, and the language can be confusing. Terms like ACT, SAT, SAT², CSU, UC, A-G, AP, will have crept into our seniors' vocabulary by early fall. This may lead to more new terms that can be a challenge for both parents and students.

Students will be discussing essays, personal statements, GPAs, the FAFSA, CalGrants, My UC Application, Cal State Apply, the Common App, and needing an FSA ID. It's important for both parents and students to take an active role to learn what these terms mean, and keep track of the various steps in the application process.

When asking for explanations, a common answer we might hear is "it's on the internet." Just because it is on a website does not necessarily mean we understand it, or how to use it, or its importance. That is when we turn to our high school counselors for help with the college application process. From the development of

college lists, to completing letters of recommendation, listening, and guidance, our high school counselors will help our seniors submit their college applications.
