Willits weather and rain

The National Weather Service Eureka website is now reporting information for Willits taken from a weather station on the Mendocino College North County Center campus on East Commercial Street.

For a while, when users searched the site for "Willits, CA," although the forecasts were for the Willits area, the "current conditions" like hourly temperatures and rain information were being reported from the "Soda Creek" weather station 20 miles east of Willits, and at a higher elevation.

You can find the Willits station, aka the EW4027 station, by visiting https:// forecast.weather.gov then entering "Willits, CA" in the search box.

After opening that Willits page, which shows current conditions, any weather alerts, and the forecast, if you hit the "3 day history" link on the right, you'll see a page reporting hourly temperatures, hourly precipitation, and more. The graph at the top can be selected to show all kinds of interesting weather data, including wind speeds and gusts.

Below the graph, there's a link to the "Current water year total" - the weather

Supes discuss trash dumping in **Brooktrails**

Last week the Mendocino Countv Board of Supervisors unanimously approved closing the roads leading to the Dogwood cul de sacs in Brooktrails "to prevent serious and continual illegal dumping" of trash in the area.

Dogwood Terrace and Dogwood Lane, which are connected to Ridge Road in Brooktrails, are now closed for at least the next 18 months in what the supervisors called a "temporary solution" to the trash dumping problem, which they acknowledged is pervasive in many other areas throughout the county as well.

On October 28, a few days after the BOS meeting, Willits City Councilmember Greta Kanne, along with several volunteers and Supervisors John Haschak and Maureen Mulheren, helped lead an effort to clean up much of the trash still left at the Dogwood cul de sacs (see page 5 for more details on this).

Kanne posted on her Facebook page on October 28 about the latest cleanup effort that day.


Brooktrails man arrested for failure to register Sgt. James L. Wells, for MCSO

On October 13, 2022, a Mendocino County Sheriff's Office deputy became Donald aware Ralph Wiltse, Jr., 35, of Willits was possibly in violation of 290.011 PC (failing to register as a sex offender).

The deputy conducted an investigation and found Wiltse last registered in 2021 with an address in Santa Clara County, California. The deputy learned Wiltse had been living in Willits and had failed to register his new address as required by law.

On October 14, 2022, at 7:20 am, MCSO deputies went to a location on the 27000 block of Hawk Drive in Willits [Brooktrails] where they contacted and arrested Wiltse for failing to register as a sex offender in Mendocino County.

Wiltse was booked into the Mendocino County Jail where he was to be held in lieu of \$15,000 bail.

COVID update from **Public Health**



"We've had a good month," said Mendocino Health County Public Officer Andy Coren, during his October press conference last Friday. Dr. Coren addressed COVID, monkeypox, and the annual flu, among other health issues.

In Mendocino County, as of October 21, there have been 7 confirmed cases of monkeypox. In the United States, there have been 25,600 cases and 2 deaths. In California, numbers are declining, and there have been no deaths. Monkey pox is predominately seen in Los Angeles, San Diego and San Francisco.

As far as the annual flu, Dr. Coren said, after a late peak in spring this year, there have been no new flu cases yet this fall in "congregate living facilities" like acute care general hospitals, long-term care facilities, or skilled nursing facilities.

Measures do not increase

sales tax

To the Editor:

This reply addresses two incorrect or misleading points in Dale Brigg's letter published in the October 20, 2022 edition regarding ballot Measures O and P.

Briggs' main concern seems to be his belief that the measures would increase the current sales tax. He states "do you really want to pay an additional .5% added on the current 9+% sales tax you currently pay on purchases."

Briggs' statement is factually incorrect in two ways. First, the sales tax rate in Mendocino County is currently 7.875% (the bulk of which - 7.250% - is state tax). Cities can have their own additional increments to the sales tax as is the case in Willits, which is the only place in the county with a cumulative rate over 9%. (See https://www.cdtfa.ca.gov/formspubs/cdtfa95. pdf).

More importantly, if both Measures O and P pass the current sales tax level WILL NOT INCREASE as Briggs incorrectly asserts, instead it will remain exactly as it is today.

Briggs also points out that Measure P is a general sales tax and could therefore be spent on anything. That is correct but misleading. Briggs fails to mention that, at the same time they sent Measure P to the ballot, the board of supervisors unanimously passed Resolution 22-159 which provides a detailed map of the intended use of money to support the needs of our emergency service agencies and for wildfire prevention efforts.

The resolution also specifies that the county will produce a report showing how the funds were actually distributed each year. It will be crystal clear if these funds are used as intended and easy to hold the supervisors accountable if they are not.

Briggs suggests that, instead of passing Measure O, there should be fees for services so that, e.g., children should start being charged to check out books. Notably, Briggs does not suggest that there should be new fees for services each time a local fire department responds to an emergency.

Transportation board rejects Skunk Train proposal

Late Thursday, October 20, the Federal Surface Transportation Board soundly rejected the Mendocino Railway Company's bid to take over 13 miles of the Great Redwood Trail. This massive move by federal regulators paves the way for one of the most important steps vet for the Great Redwood Trail protecting and preserving 175 miles of rail line forever through the rail banking process.

This will allow the Great Redwood Trail to begin breaking ground on these miles of line and ensure the former rail right of way remains in public ownership in perpetuity. Senate Majority Leader Mike

statement on the action: "This is a momentous day for the future of the North Coast and the Great Redwood Trail. With this proposal soundly rejected by the federal government, I'm thrilled that we'll once and for all start moving dirt and getting large swaths of the Great

"The Surface Transportation Board was extremely clear and concise in their decision, and we are grateful for all of the work they have put into making the trail a reality. Obviously, we'll be on the look-out for any potential Hail Mary attempts to appeal, and we'll be at the ready to beat them back in the coming few weeks."

The Surface Transportation Board stated in the ruling: "Because Mendocino Railway has not demonstrated financial responsibility, MR's OFA [offer of financial assistance] will be rejected and the OFA process concluded." Caryl Hart, chair of the Great Redwood Trail Agency, said: "Thursday's clear and definitive ruling is yet another victory in the progress of the Great Redwood Trail. This has been a long process, but an outstanding result and a definitive win. I can't thank our legal team enough - they have done an outstanding job of showing why the trail is so important to the Golden State and North Coast."

New solar-carport project at Howard hospital

This two-phase project will begin the first week of November and will take approximately five to six months. Visitors to the hospital and clinics may encounter some closed-off sections of the parking lot. To better accommodate patients and visitors with parking spots close the hospital, associates are being encouraged to park as far away from the building as possible. Patient drop-off near the entrance to the Emergency Department will be available



On a cold, crisp Saturday morning, on two spurs off Ridge Road atop Brooktrails, about 10 intrepid volunteers undertook a project to clean up and dispose of the trash, pieces of equipment, refrigerators, burned-out trailers, exercise equipment, and much more from both Dogwood Terrace and Dogwood Lane, both cul-de-sac roads that don't have any houses

Mulheren. It was the second phase of the cleanup program on these two roads and the volunteers managed to dispose of most of the debris left by some of the less-than-civic-minded residents.

"We're helping out with our community," said Jerry Albright, who came with his trailer after stopping to pick up trash along his route. "Another wonderful deposit from some of our less-reputable residents. They're not camping out here. They're just dropping their garbage and their remodel stuff. There's an RV that got burned down. There are all kinds of interesting things.


"I'm helping here with Greta Kanne, who organized this effort," explained Albright. "This is my second time helping here. We just got it started in September. I was the only dump trailer. What you see here is what's left and that's a lot.

"The first time we got three tons of garbage," he continued. "I made three runs to the dump until I got flat tires in my trailer. That was probably a third of what we're pulling out of here today." In order to avoid the flat tires this time, Albright brought a powerful magnet on wheels to clear the area of nails and other puncture threats.

explained Mulheren. "The Recycle Board is a [Joint Powers Authority] of the three cities and the county. Pre-COVID they would have been the ones who are cleaning up something like this, but because of challenges we've had with staffing and the executive director, there's really no capacity for them to get out here and clean it up.

"Tuesday, the board voted to close the road. The Department of Transportation is under the board. The road will be closed to, hopefully, prevent any more illegal dumping. My concern was to get as much out as possible before the rain comes.³

Why do people dump their trash and equipment instead of bringing it to the Willits Solid Waste Transfer Station?

"This kind of dumping is an interesting problem that happens all over the county," Mulheren continued. "We're working on a voucher program for low-income people that need help paying for the transfer-station fees or possibly needing help to pay for a monthly service collection at their

"We're trying to figure out the root cause," she said, "and how we can help some people that possibly can't afford it. But I think, at the end of the day, that some people just don't put the same care and concern into our environment that others do and this seems like an easy location to dump their trash."

Zac, who brought a large trailer, shared: "This used to be my old stomping grounds here. We used to ride dirt bikes up here and have a good time. It never looked like this. I think it's all over the state. We have more people here now with a different attitude towards nature than we used to have. They don't see the nature and the beauty. They just see it as some place they can dump their refuse.

"I didn't want to help out until they said they were going to put [barriers] up," said Zac. "They're going to block off the road. That's why I'm up here helping out because it's not going to be needed every week anymore. They're actually doing something to help the problem. I just hope it works.

"Nobody uses this road, a cul-de-sac, for anything other than dumping," Zac continued. "There are no houses on either of the Dogwoods. If they do dump their trash, it will be right over the [barriers] and everyone will be able to see it and it will get cleaned up quicker, hopefully. This is horrible, what it's gotten to. There's a lot of toxic stuff out here."

Thankfully, it will now be harder to hide the dumped refuse. The Mendocino Department of Transportation, as of Monday, has closed off the two roads with rather large boulders and stones.

"Please don't dump your trash on the side of the road," urged Mulheren. "There are options available if you need help. They can contact me at my Facebook page (www. facebook.com/mo4mendo) or social services to see if they can receive some help in paying for the transfer station."




