Ukiah kicks off the holidays

Skating rink, Parade of Lights, Christmas tree lighting, photos with Santa, and more this Saturday

Ukiah's 2017 holiday festivities kick off Saturday, December 2 in a big way, with the return of the "Ukiah on Ice" skating rink in historic downtown Ukiah, the Parade of Lights, combining the Truckers Light Parade and the Downtown Parade of Lights, the lighting of the Christmas tree in Alex Thomas Plaza, and photos with Santa, starting at 7 pm.

The parade starts at 6 pm on North State Street at Brush Street and follows North State Street south to Alex Thomas Plaza. Santa will get off the fire engine in the Plaza at the end of the parade, light the Christmas tree, and then sit in his chair for photos - and to hear what kids want for Christmas.

Lit vehicles of any kind are welcome to sign up for the parade, but the deadline to enter is November 30: Call 707-391-3664 for entry info. Some of the locations open for viewing the parade: Slam Dunk Pizza, Kasie Gray - W Real Estate, Ukiah Massage, Black Oak Coffee Roasters, and Paper Birds Boutique - or book a seat at one of the downtown restaurants.

The ice rink opens at 3 pm on Saturday, with a hockey

demonstration by the Santa Rosa Flyers Youth Hockey Club, and opens to the public at 5 pm. Vendors will serve coffee, hot chocolate and donuts, and community nonprofit groups will have tables – including holiday crafting - around the Plaza.

Skating rates are \$10 per skate day session or \$8 for a two-hour session for students (including skates), and the rink can be reserved for private parties, too. The ice rink will be open every day – including Christmas and New Year's Day – through January 7, 2018. Kids aged 6 to 18 are invited to free hockey instruction sessions on Saturday mornings from 9 to 10:15 am, starting December 9. 

MTA's Holiday Trolley is back for family fun in 2017

For 20 years, Mendocino Transit Authority's Holiday Trolley has offered free rides to shoppers and families celebrating the holiday season, and this year the trolley's sponsors anticipate that thousands of folks will hop aboard to enjoy the festive ride.

The 2017 Holiday Trolley began its annual run on Friday, November 24, and continues through Saturday, December 23.

"The trolley is a traditional part of Ukiah's holiday festivities and is a favorite with families and children," said Carla Meyer, general manager of MTA. "We applaud the many generous local businesses who support the free service and make it a wonderful success."

The "antique" Trolley (it was purchased new in 1997) is decorated with twinkling lights and garlands of festive greenery. It travels a 45-minute circular route that includes Ukiah shopping centers, the Ukiah on Ice outdoor skating rink downtown, and several popular restaurants. Travelers can get on at designated stops or simply flag the trolley for a ride at a safe pull-out along the route.

The trolley service is provided as a partnership between Greater Ukiah Chamber of Commerce, Ukiah Main Street Program and MTA, with major sponsorship from Savings Bank of Mendocino County. Twenty local businesses provide the support necessary to bring the trolley and its "small town Christmas" cheer to Ukiah shoppers and visitors.

Trolley holiday hours until December 21 are: hourly from noon until 6:45 pm every Saturday and Sunday plus 3 pm to 5:45 pm Thursdays and Fridays. On December 22 and 23, the trolley will run between 3 pm and 5:45 pm.





Good Farm Fund celebrates food and farmers at **4th Annual Winter Feast**

Annual Good Farm Fund Winter Feast at Barra Winery, located at 7051 North State Street, on Tuesday, December 5 from 5 to 9 pm. This always-popular event includes a family-style farm-to-table dinner with locally raised meat, fruits, vegetables, wild mushrooms, artisan cheeses and arains. Local beer and wine will also be available for purchase. A silent auction, perfect for holiday shopping, and live music from the Back Porch Project will provide entertainment

This year's event will also feature the announcement of the Good Farm Fund grant award selections for 2017. Come help the winners celebrate!

The Good Farm Fund, fiscally sponsored by North Coast Opportunities, Inc., is run entirely by volunteers who care about supporting local food and agriculture. Founded in 2015, the Good Farm Fund provides direct support to small farmers in Mendocino and Lake counties in the form of small, capacity-building grants.

This is the third year the Good Farm Fund is awarding grants. In 2015, \$7,000 was given; in 2016, the amount grew to \$20,000; this year, grants will total \$30,000. The grants are made possible by farm-to-table dinners like this one, as well as from the generous support of this year's foundation sponsors: Ukiah Natural Foods, Frey Winery and Ukiah Adventist Health.

"These grants have a real, tangible impact for local farms," says Good Farm Fund Co-Founder Caroline Radice, a farmer herself. "As a kid, I used to go berrypicking with my mom, and then she'd come home and make iam, which is how I learned how to can.

"My parents would stop at the farmers' market or a roadside farm stand to pick up fresh green beans or corn for dinner," Radice remembered. "So many of us have wonderful memories like that, and the Good Farm Fund is about honoring and continuing those traditions, about

> One grant recipient is Carson Elmer of Carson and Bees, a Ukiah-based honey producer who received \$1,500 in 2016. The joyful addition of a new baby to his family meant that there weren't finances available to continue expanding his honey business. A Good Farm Fund grant purchased new hives, allowing the business to stay on track, which means more honeybees pollinating fruits and flowers at local FA farms where Carson keeps his hives, and more honey available for local

customers.

"I was looking at my fiveyear business plan thinking, 'this isn't going to work,' and then the grant came through," explains Elmer. "Thanks to the Good Farm Fund, we're right on schedule.

Tickets to the Winter Feast are \$30 in advance, \$40 at the door, \$15 for kids 15 and under. This event always sells out. Tickets are available online at www.goodfarmfund.org, at the Westside Renaissance Market, the Ukiah Natural Foods Co-op, and J.D. Redhouse.

Proceeds will support the Good Farm Fund's Fire Recovery Fund and Farm Grant Program. The event is sponsored by North Coast Opportunities, Ukiah Natural Foods Co-op, Adventist Health, Frey Winery, Thompson's Party Rentals, the MendoLake Food Hub, First Five, Cold Creek Compost, Flow Kana, North Coast Brewing Co., Community First Credit Union, Yokayo Ranch, The Savings Bank of Mendocino County, and Black Dog Farm & Catering.
