CAL FIRE awards grant to Sierra Pacific Industries to grow 25 million seedlings

Sacramento, December 6 – The California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection awarded Sierra Pacific Industries a \$3 million grant to advance production of tree seedlings in California. This grant leverages SPI's investment in the first phase of a more than \$10 million state-of-the-art nursery to be built and operated by SPI in Gazelle, in Siskiyou County. The nursery will specialize in production of native conifer seedlings for forest restoration, research, and conservation projects.

"CAL FIRE is very pleased to be partnering with Sierra Pacific Industries to expand tree nursery production in California, especially now when reforestation is so critical for the future of our conifer forests," said Stewart McMorrow, staff chief of Wildfire Resilience at CAL FIRE. "This nursery will add much-needed capacity and jobs and will serve to further our combined efforts to restore forest cover on private and public lands. We are thankful that Sierra Pacific Industries can make this a reality."

Wildfires have burned millions of forested acres in California in recent years. Current nursery capacity in the Western U.S. is not sufficient to fill the need for seedlings to reforest these damaged landscapes.

More than a third of the forests that have burned recently have seen high-severity fire, which kills at least 75 percent of vegetation, leaving altered landscapes of dead trees behind. Without direct intervention, the most severely burned forests are likely to be replaced by brush.

This funding will enable SPI to start project construction sooner than planned, helping to increase capacity to rapidly respond to reforestation needs and ensuring California-grown seedlings are available for post-fire recovery efforts.

"The demands to revive forestlands in the state far outweigh the supply of materials that our industry is able to currently accommodate," said Jimi Scheid, CAL FIRE Reforestation Services manager. "Being able to amplify these outputs in the form of ready-to-plant, climatically suitable seedlings, will help us mitigate the growing threats to our forests and the benefits they provide."

This new nursery will help address the need for additional seedling production in a short amount of time. Production will ramp up over the first several years with 6 million seedlings projected to be sown in 2024, followed by another 12 million seedlings the following year.

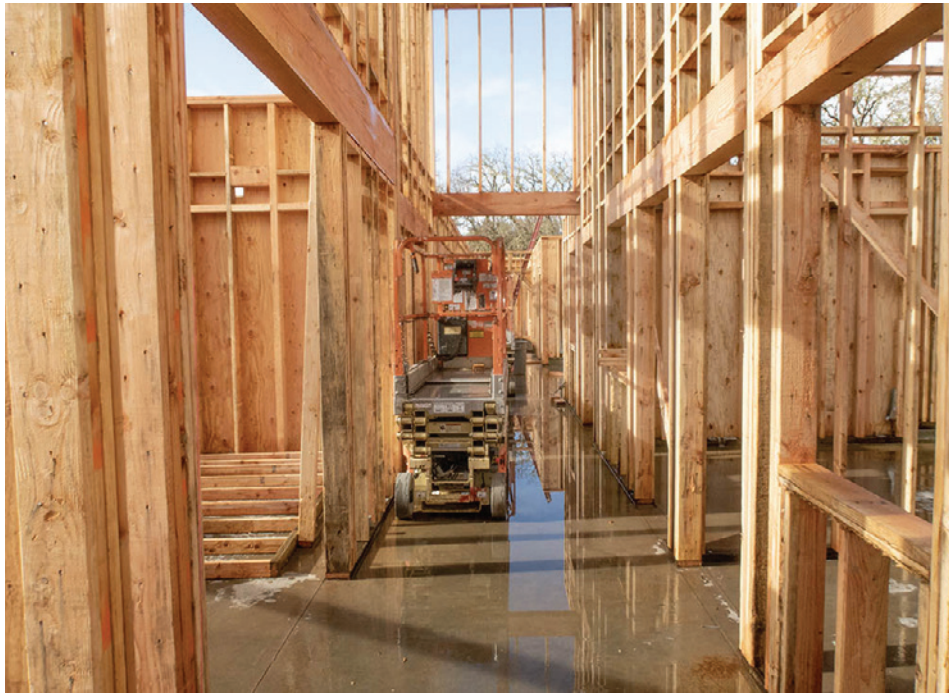
The nursery, expected to be fully operational by 2026, will be capable of producing 25 million seedlings annually. Additionally, it will employ about 10 full-time people and as many as 110 seasonal workers, which is a benefit to the rural community of Gazelle.

"Healthy, growing forests provide clean water and air, important wildlife habitat, recreational opportunities, and jobs for rural economies," said Jessica Hinojosa, Sierra Pacific Industries Tree Improvement manager. "SPI is making this investment to help meet our state's growing needs for high-quality, native conifer seedlings. We appreciate CAL FIRE's support for this immense endeavor. We look forward partnering with public and private organizations across the state that are working to recover and restore California's forests."

The Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE) serves and safeguards the people and protects the property and resources of California. The men and women of CAL FIRE are dedicated to the fire protection and stewardship of over 31 million acres of California's privately owned wildlands. CAL FIRE's mission emphasizes the management and protection of California's natural resources; a goal that is accomplished through ongoing assessment and study of the state's natural resources.

In California, SPI has over 3,400 crew members supporting the company's operations that include 1.9 million acres of timberlands, 10 sawmills, three millwork and remanufacturing plants, two bark plants, five biomass cogeneration energy plants, and windows manufacturing plants.

Construction of new California Conservation Corps facility in Willits begins to take shape

The California Conservation Corps is on the move, to Willits, with an estimated move-in in the summer of 2024, at 440 East Hill Road, just west of the bypass and across from Adventist Health Howard Memorial Hospital. The 27.7-acre site will accommodate around 100 corps members plus a support staff of leaders, trainers, etc.

"We didn't do a formal groundbreaking per se but we've been working for several months now," stated Dan Millsap, director of capital outlay for the CCC and overseer of the project. "We've started to put down the building pads and are driving piles for the bridge. The rains kind of shut us down for a bit."

But construction is proceeding during times of compliant weather. A skeleton of the administration building can be seen from East Hill Road, as can the poles upon which sit solar panels to power the cameras by which the remote supervisors can oversee the project.

"We're relocating our Ukiah center and we have staff who already live in Willits, so they're pretty excited about the move," explained Chris Van Horne, public information officer, communications and outreach manager for the CCC.

"The Ukiah location was a former dairy farm," said Van Horne, "and we needed to expand for our operations. When we met with the Mendocino County Office of Education, who is the property owner at the Ukiah site, they were not amenable to selling the property at that point in time so we did a search and found the location in Willits."

According to the California Environmental Quality Act website: "The project consists of a new CCC residential center that includes a total of approximately 64,000 square feet of new building construction. The center will include 12 buildings consisting of an administration building, seven

Man arrested with stolen checkbook in Willits

On Tuesday, November 29 at 10:15 pm, Mendocino County Sheriff's Office deputies were on routine patrol in the 100 block of Kawi Place in Willits.

The deputies observed Carlos Ogawa, 35, of Fort Bragg, exit a vehicle with another passenger. The deputies were familiar with Ogawa and knew he was out of custody on bond. As a term of his release, Ogawa was court-ordered to submit to search by law enforcement.

The deputies contacted Ogawa and searched his person, finding no contraband. The deputies searched Ogawa's vehicle and located a checkbook belonging to an adult female, 77, from Ukiah.

The deputies observed some of the checks appeared to have been altered with Ogawa's name inscribed in the "Pay to" line. The deputies continued their search and located other items they suspected to

be stolen from other parts of Mendocino County.

Deputies in the Ukiah area contacted the adult female owner of the checkbook, who confirmed the checks were stolen and Ogawa had no legal right to possess them.

The deputies interviewed Ogawa and continued their investigation. As a result of their investigation, the deputies developed probable cause to believe Ogawa was in violation of the following: 470(b) PC (Felony Forgery), 475(b) PC (Felony Possession Blank Check), 496(A) PC (Misdemeanor Possession Stolen Property), and 12022.1 PC (Felony Commit Offense while on Bond).

Ogawa was arrested on the listed charges and booked into the Mendocino County Jail where he was held in lieu of \$25,000.00 bail.

dormitories, an education building, a recreation building, a multi-purpose building with kitchen and dining room, a warehouse with work area, and a hazardous-materials storage room.

"The site will include asphalt paved surfaces for driveways and parking, and concrete paving for service and staging areas and walkways. The project also includes a paved emergency crew and vehicle staging area and solar photovoltaic array."

The solar array will power the facility, resulting in near "zero net energy per the governor's executive order B-18-12 and achieve, at minimum, a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Silver certification," per the California Environmental Quality Act website.

The California Conservation Corps was formed through legislation signed by then-governor Jerry Brown in 1976. Its purpose was to provide education, jobs and training to California youth.

"The CCC mission is to protect and enhance California's natural resources and to develop young adults through hard work and education," explained Millsap. "We're a youth work program to give young adults in California, 18 to 25, military veterans up to 29, stepping stones to meaningful careers, more education."

"They can get scholarships while working with us so they can afford and pursue whatever degrees they may be interested in," said Millsap. "Maybe they don't want to go to college. They can become firefighters with CalFire. This unit partners with the Mendocino unit of CalFire. We'll be operating two fire crews, currently staging out of Ukiah, but they'll be moving up to Willits."

"We do a lot of salmon restoration work in Mendocino County. There are a lot of these natural resource jobs that most people may not know how to get into. We also get some college graduates in who need field experience to get some of the jobs that the California youth are after and the CCC is a great way to do that."

"We work with John Muir Charter School, here in the north part of the state," Millsap continued, "so they can finish and earn their high school diploma. Some are at community college or college or some who have actually finished college. It's a real diverse mix of young adults from across the state, very representative of the state. Our mission statement is to help these young adults kick their lives off at that young age with success in the future."

In addition, many of the CCC youth can be seen volunteering on projects in and around Willits and have provided valuable assistance to organizations with fundraising events, public gardens, etc.

"We recruit through social media, traditional media, TV ads in some of the larger population centers throughout the state like in Los Angeles and San Diego. Word of mouth has historically worked for us. We've had parents who were in the CCC and now their kids are in the corps. We'll give presentations to just about any group that would care to have us. We do job fairs pretty regularly, community events," said Millsap.

The infusion of 100 new young, hard-working residents in Willits, who already have housing, could provide some sort of an economic boost to the area, as they can leave the campus to partake in services, restaurants and entertainment in the town.

a budget deficit of \$25 billion” this fiscal year as well – a trend that could ultimately impact how much the county receives in state funding.

The county’s \$6.1 million deficit stems largely from a \$3.6 million health plan gap in 2020/21, and another \$685,000 in health plan needs this year.

The budget ad hoc committee put forward a list of suggestions with austerity measures and other strategies for the board to consider aimed at helping the county’s budget issues, both in the short term and long term.

These included giving up ownership of the county’s six public parks, using up more than half of the \$4.5 million currently in the “retirement contribution designated reserve,” and implementing a hiring freeze on “all non-mandated General Fund budget” positions – “excluding any positions currently in recruitment.”

The list also suggested possibly eliminating any “surplus vehicles” owned by the county; “consider utilizing telework capabilities to reduce space needs”; and obligating \$1.25 million from the “Local Assistance and Tribal Consistency Fund” “to fund a portion of one-time needs ... and additional legal fees.”

The board eventually voted to ask staff to come back with more information on these and other suggestions as to how much each would cut back the deficit. They plan on revisiting the issue at their meeting next week on December 13.

For the parks, the ad hoc suggested first considering “decommissioning” buildings and services at the Mariposa Park/Perkins River Access in the Ukiah area.

Second District Supervisor Maureen Mulheren pushed back on this idea a bit, asking if the county’s park system could be improved to better collect revenue and attract tourism.

“So it would be a long-term strategy, and it wouldn’t be quick money for this year, but we have been talking about creating a membership-style program where you support the parks through paying access fees,” she said. “I really think that Mendocino County needs to look at working with the state, creating a parks program much like they have on the coast for the future Great Redwood Trail, including the Russian River access and Lake Mendocino. And potentially having a parks program that’s not run through the county, but that captures that three-legged tourism stool that inland Mendocino County really needs to support our economy.

“So I’m not super excited about the idea of just unloading Perkins River Access because it does have some real opportunities,” she continued. “If the City of Ukiah is willing to take it on then I understand that, I would be grateful for that. But also we, in my opinion, should not be so shortsighted to just lose these opportunities. Especially when larger conversations about inland tourism opportunities are happening like the Great Redwood Trail, like the Russian River confluence, and like what needs to happen at Lake Mendocino.”

Fourth District Supervisor Dan Gjerde disagreed with this assessment, saying that there were more important priorities than parks for the county to focus on.

“I know this is going to sound a little coldehearted, but we have 300 miles of county paved roads that we know will never be repaved unless there’s a funding stream that we don’t have right now,” he said. “We have 300 miles that will be paved, 300 miles that won’t be paved.... How can we maintain the pretense that we’re going to keep these five or six county parks that are basically neighborhood parks?

“I think we need to set a schedule where in the next two to three years, a certain date and point in time, they will be offloaded,” he continued. “We will put them on the open market if no non-profit steps forward, if no community services district steps forward.... I think it’s not realistic to maintain this in our portfolio. We’ve got 65 parcels that the county owns, 65 different properties. We have to have a strategy to unload some of those 65 properties, and those six parks are among the 65 that have to be unloaded.”

According to the budget report from the county’s fiscal team, a “Parks Needs Assessment” showed that \$7.6 million is currently needed to address “critical and safety needs” at various county parks, though some grant money will likely help with this.

Supervisor Gjerde made two other suggestions for helping with the deficit that the board seemed open to considering.

One was to consolidate a Sheriff’s Office dispatch center with that of the City of Ukiah – an idea which he said has been supported by successive county sheriffs.

His other suggestion was to offer county employees two different health plan options, with one being cheaper – though providing less coverage – than the current plan. County employees typically pay around 25% of health plan costs, so Gjerde reasoned that some may be open to this idea.

The fiscal team budget report also included a section suggesting ways for the county to streamline its workforce and increase pay for many employees.

The “compaction and alignment” plan they laid out would reduce the number of “wage grades” from 309 to 80, have no wage grade lower than \$17.50 per hour, have 2.5% pay difference between each wage grade, and 10% “between classifications in a series and reporting relationships.”

County CEO Darcie Antle said these changes would help the county “hire and retain the best employees,” but would increase costs to the county by about \$4.5 million annually.

Antle was hopeful the plan could be implemented by July, but board Chair Ted Williams seemed skeptical about that, considering the \$6.1 million deficit they were already facing.

“That seems unrealistic,” he said. “What am I missing? ... We’re negative right now. How do we implement that in July?”

“We can work towards it if we can find the money,” responded Antle. “And we can realign the goals and reorganize.”

First District Supervisor Glenn McGourty gave some positive feedback on the plan.

“It’s somewhat aspirational,” acknowledged McGourty. “I think that I like this because we have a lot of oddities – a kind of broke design of county government here in Mendocino County– and this is one of them. And I think trying to make a leaner structure for our wage grades is very much a positive thing. Whether or not we can pull it off in one season is questionable, but it might be that we phase this in over a little more time. But I think it’s a good goal for us to pursue.”

While some labor negotiations with county worker unions are still ongoing, earlier at the meeting the board did approve an agreement between five different union groups and the county to give \$3,000 one-time payments to full-time county employees. Part-time county employees working 20-47 hours per pay period will get a \$1,500 bonus.

The money for those payments is coming out of the \$16.8 million in federal American Rescue Plan Act money the county was allotted and began receiving last year.

New cannabis manual

Also at the meeting, there was a lengthy discussion about an item to approve a new cannabis grant program and accompanying manual meant to assist those seeking annual state permits.

The Local Jurisdiction Assistance Grants Program is funded by the state, and the county was awarded \$17.5 million in January 2022 to help with those attempting to transition to annual cannabis licenses.

According to the manual created by the Mendocino Cannabis Department for the program, “a portion” of the \$17.5 million “was set aside by county staff for the purpose of offering direct grants and fee waivers to qualified provisional license holders located within the unincorporated areas of Mendocino County.”

Third District Supervisor John Haschak pulled the item from the Consent Calendar for discussion, with concerns about the manual’s lack of clarity in laying out the application process and other issues.

The manual was eventually approved in its original form 4-1 by the board with Haschak dissenting.

Mulheren did include in her motion that “the Mendocino Cannabis Department staff prepare an application guidance document and release that to the public at their next public meeting, and that that also be brought to the [General Government Standing Committee] for more robust discussion.”

had three seats up for election, and the winners are the same as the top three vote-getters in initial results. Incumbent Jeanne King won with 17.79% of the final vote (1,774 votes); incumbent Paula Nunez won with 15.94% (1,590 votes); and challenger Jennifer Sookne won with 15.84 % of the final vote (1,580 votes).

In the Brooktrails board race, with three seats up for election, challenger Joanne Cavallari won with 26.26% of the final vote (622 votes); incumbent Ed Horrick won with 24.57% of the final vote (582 votes); and incumbent Rick Williams won with 23.98% of the final vote (568 votes). Board member Williams won reelection with 4 votes more than incumbent Tony Orth, who received 23.81% of the vote (564 votes).

Final results for other candidates in the Willits school board race, so far: incumbent Robert Chavez gained 14.38% (1,434 votes); challenger David Liker won 12.21% (1,218 votes); challenger Colby Friend won 9.30% (927 votes); write-in candidate April Lamprich won 7.91% (789 votes); and challenger Jeffery Ritchley gained 6.63% (661 votes).

security the city needs, so water and city managers have been actively looking for a location for a large water storage project and the Recreation District’s property fit the need.

The property consists of 582 acres (six parcels) that are primarily zoned Timber Production / Forest Land and are also home to highly sensitive habitats. This situation required creativity, and the result was an enhancement to both water supply and to rare species.

In coordination with the California Department of Fish and Wildlife, the City of Fort Bragg has created a design whereby the 30 acres for water storage will be located with minimal impact to rare plant life, and the remaining 550 acres will be used to develop a Community Forest, including conservation easements, wildlife-friendly protective fencing, restoration in the Mendocino Cypress Woodland, removal of invasive species, installation of boardwalks on existing trails, and an on-site resident/manager to bring full-time oversight to the property.

“Because the project will fill the reservoirs during the winter months, it will reduce impacts to the stream aquatic ecosystem,” says John Smith, director of Public Works for Fort Bragg. “For this reason, Fish & Wildlife is excited to work with the city on this project.”

In total, the project will provide multiple benefits to the community, including an additional 44,000,000 gallons of water, fire protection through helicopter water access, and watershed and sensitive habitat conservation.

The Mendocino County Water Agency is a special district that encompasses all of Mendocino County and is governed by the Mendocino County Board of Supervisors sitting as the board of directors, and administered by the Mendocino County Executive Office.


