City now offering

housing rehab loans

The City of Willits Community Development Department is establishing a new loan program to help long-time residents called the Owner-Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Program. The program targets low- to moderateincome Willits residents to aid with repairs to their houses. The need for the program has been increasing since 2019 when the housing stock estimate showed that 88% of Willits homes are 30 years or older, and 31% are 70 years or older and in desperate need of repair.

The program is designed with residents' needs in mind, to help current homeowners and occupants flexibly repair their homes in a way that is customizable to them and their financial needs.

Qualified homeowners may be eligible to receive a 0% interest deferred loan ranging from \$25,000 to \$50,000. The program receives funding from the California Department of Housing and Community Development's Permanent

Driver charged with attempted murder

in hit-and-run of juvenile

On Thursday, June 6, at 11:10 pm, the Willits Police Department responded to reports of a hit- andrun vehicle vs. pedestrian collision in the 100 block of Holly Street in Willits.

On arrival, the WPD officers located a group of juveniles providing aid to an unconscious 16- yearold male minor lying in the middle of the roadway. The juvenile was breathing, but had experienced significant critical injuries because of the collision. Officers provided medical aid to the victim until Little Lake Fire Department and Medstar emergency medical providers arrived.

Witnesses at the scene reported that a full-size pickup truck had intentionally struck the juvenile and had then fled the scene.

THIRD DISTRICT SUPERVISOR'S REPORT

June 2024 update

Around the Mendocino County, Memorial Day was celebrated. I would like to thank all the veterans. American Legion posts, Veterans of Foreign Wars, and other groups who keep the memory alive of sacrifices made. My father was in the army. He was in Day 2 of the D-Day invasion. He only talked about it one time and that was the only time I saw him cry. I was fortunate to have had the opportunity to serve in the Peace Corps. As we look forward to 4th of July celebrations, we honor those who serve our communities, county, and country through public service, military service, or service making this world a better place.

The Board of Supervisors passed a balanced budget for fiscal year 2024-2025. Like last year, we had to use \$7 million of one-time-only money. We will have to continue cutting costs wherever possible. We do have labor agreements with all the bargaining units. We cut about \$8 million in creating efficiencies and reductions, and we will have to continue cost

In projects that I worked on directly, these were some of the savings this year. We were able to save over \$600,000 in a "golden handshake" incentive and \$120,000 in deleting the Cultural Services Agency department head and replacing that position with a County Librarian position who oversees a branch library. The Cannabis Department lowered their county costs by about \$500,000, and offering permit amnesty for Planning and Building Services brought in over 40 new buildings into the tax system. The museum is transitioning to a non-profit agency, which will reduce county costs in the future.

The budget going forward will have two-year projections. This will help in forecasting how decisions made will play out over a longer period of time. The Teeter Plan, which helps provide stable funding for schools and community service districts, is projected to bring in \$1.5 million, which is good news since it was a negative on the budget. County facilities have seen a 10% drop in electrical usage and a 27% drop in gas utility usage. Cannabis taxes brought in \$3.2 million, when it was budgeted at \$1 million.

Unfortunately, the board approved a Master Tax Sharing Agreement without proper analyses done of how it would affect county services and finances. I was the lone dissenting vote. The tax sharing agreement allows cities to annex areas. This can be a fairly simple proposition in an area where there are just residential properties. However, when areas that are in the county have sales tax and transient occupancy tax generating businesses, it becomes much more complicated and risky for the county. Mendocino County projects a loss of \$3 million if. for example, the area north of Ukiah is annexed. This includes Raley's, auto dealers, motels, and many other businesses (14 of the 25 highest sales tax generators in the county). Yet the county will still be responsible for coroner duties and other law enforcement activities, social services, mental and public health, and other services. This loss of income will affect the county's budget unless there is a huge surge of economic development as the proponents





Clearlake man arrested near Willits on warrant for child sex crimes

In July of 2023, the Mendocino County Sheriff's Office initiated an investigation into the sexual assault of a minor. Throughout the nearly year-long investigation, Mendocino County Sheriff's Office detectives established that the suspect, Christopher Neil Kige (40-year-old-male from Clearlake), had allegedly committed multiple acts of sexual abuse against a juvenile victim.

These acts included the continuous sexual abuse of a child, lewd or lascivious acts upon a child under the age of 14, unlawful sexual intercourse with a minor, oral copulation of a minor under 14, and sexual penetration with a foreign object.

Mendocino County Sheriff's Office detectives learned that Kiger, upon learning of this investigation, fled the state of California in a suspected attempt to avoid arrest. This case was submitted to the Mendocino County District Attorney's Office for consideration of an arrest warrant against Kiger. The case was filed with the Superior Court of California in the County of Mendocino, and an arrest warrant was subsequently issued for Kiger's arrest.

In May of 2024, MCSO detectives learned Kiger had possibly returned to the area. Detectives attempted to locate Kiger in Lake County where he has family members. During these attempts, MCSO detectives learned that Kiger knew he was wanted and somehow knew the bail amount of his arrest warrant. Detectives learned that Kiger was avoiding capture until he could obtain the required amount of money for a bail bond. It should be noted that the bail had been set at \$425,000, pursuant to the State of Christopher Neil Kiger of Clearlake. California bail schedule for the above offenses



On June 6, MCSO detectives were able to utilize investigative tools to track down and locate Kiger at a remote location at the 3300 block of Williams Ranch Road near Willits, where Kiger was believed to be staying and working on an illegal cannabis operation. MCSO detectives located Kiger, who fled the area on foot into a nearby wooded area.

After a short foot pursuit, MCSO detectives were able to capture Kiger and take him into custody without any injuries sustained to Kiger or the pursuing detectives. Kiger was booked into the Mendocino County Jail for the arrest warrant, which included charges of: 288.5(a) PC (Continual sexual abuse of a minor), 288(a) PC (Lewd or lascivious acts upon a child under the age 14), 287(c)(1) PC (Oral copulation of a minor under 14), and 289(j) PC (Penetration with a foreign object with victim under 14).

MCSO detectives contacted a judge with the Superior Court of California in the County of Mendocino and requested an increase for Kiger's bail as a result of his past fleeing of the state of California and his avoidance of being arrested once he returned. This request was granted, and Kiger's bail was set at \$1,000,000.





This year's party, which was held at the Willits Charter School for the second year in a row, had an awesome attendance, too, with over 80 percent of the graduates from Willits High, Sanhedrin High and Willits Charter attending the Thursday night celebration. All seniors who attend the event, which starts at 9 pm, with doors closing at 11 pm, and make it through until the conclusion at 4 am, are guaranteed to receive cash and prizes for staying. The grand sum value of \$23,000 of cash and prizes to give away, just for staying until the end, is all the incentive most grads need to come and

A bevy of big-ticket gifts were given to the grads throughout the night, increasing in value as the night went on. Everything from big screen televisions, to wireless headphones and Bluetooth speakers, to barbeques and accessories, to dishes, bedding, small appliances, and so much more were given out to the grads, for free.

"We tried really hard to find lots of things that both boys and girls would like to receive," explained Lamprich. "We also tried to do a lot of local shopping, buying lots of great stuff from J.D. Redhouse, Monkey Wrench, and Coast Hardware. Everyone seemed really happy with the gifts they received, and we really focused on trying to make a good selection."

Students are allowed to leave the Sober Grad party early, but once gone, are not permitted back in if they chose to go. Each student who stayed received a \$100 bill at the 4 am exit gate and a prize worth at least \$50, and any who left early, forfeiting their cash, had theirs tossed back into the pot for another lucky recipient to win during the night's drawings.

If the cash and prizes weren't enough incentive, surely the copious amounts of free food, drinks, and entertainment lured in more attendees. Kids enjoyed a Red Bull bar which offered non-alcoholic beverages; Slam Dunk brought boxes and boxes of pizza; there was a build-your-own nacho bar; and those who won tokens from the poker and casino room or the carnival games were able to "buy" additional candy bars and

Topolinski's one-handed ride was more technically correct, but he lasted less time atop the spinning artificial bovine before hitting the air-filled "arena" floor. So who was the winner? Well, both - or neither for CCPRA standards – but it was great fun to watch for the gathered grads and staff while it lasted.



Making this party happen is no small feat, and Lamprich expressed her appreciation to all the businesses, community members, volunteers, and parents who helped make this year's event possible for





approached by Luis Archundia-Morales (an adult male, 30, and Willits resident), who identified himself as the vehicle driver who had struck the minor. Archundia-Morales also provided the officers with the location of the vehicle involved in the incident.

After obtaining statements from Archundia-Morales, other witnesses at the scene, and collecting security footage and other physical evidence, Archundia-Morales was arrested for his involvement in this incident. Archundia-Morales was later booked at the Mendocino County jail for 664/187 PC, Attempted Murder; 245(a)(1) PC, assault with a deadly

weapon other than a firearm; 273a(a) PC, Child endangerment resulting in great bodily injury (GBI) or death; 0243(d), Causing GBI to another; and 20001 CVC, Hit and run with injuries.

The victim in this incident was initially treated at Howard Memorial Hospital for his injuries and later flown to an out-of-the-area hospital for further treatment. The victim is currently in stable condition

The Willits Police Department would like to thank the Little Lake Fire Department, Medstar, Mendocino County Sheriff's Office, Mendocino County District Attorney's Office, and the California Highway Patrol for their assistance in this investigation.

The Willits Police Department is continuing its investigation of the incident and is asking anyone who may have been a witness to the event - and has not yet provided a statement - to call (707) 459-6122 to speak with Officer Pearson, the primary investigating officer, or Officer Angell, the assisting investigating officer.



Experimental Aircraft Association invites locals to event hosting pilots and aircraft from all over Northern California

One thing you'll discover at one of the Experimental Aircraft Association's Fly-in gatherings, to which the public is invited, is that these pilots and aircraft kit builders love to

talk. They will tell about their first flight, how they became pilots, how long they've been flying, and most importantly, the specifications of the aircraft that many of them have built and are now piloting.

The local chapter 1027 is no exception. One could spend an entire day inspecting the mostly non-production airplanes, speaking with the pilots, and generally appreciating the aerodynamics required to keep these machines in the air.

Paul Trexel is the president of the local chapter. He is a former airline pilot for Evergreen International, a passenger and cargo company, mostly utilized by governmental agencies. He, like many of the pilots, has many (23,000) hours of airtime in his log book.

"The EAA has been together for 30 years, building experimental airplanes," said Trexel. "Then they branched out to cover what we call 'general aviation' airplanes. You don't need to have an experimental or kit plane. Not airliners or military but the rest of them.

"We do about three Fly-ins a year and we invite the public up so they can see the planes. We've had planes here from Modesto, Oregon, Nevada. You never know who is going to show up," Trexel said. Indeed, the participants came from Sacramento, Ukiah, Garberville, and other points in Northern California.

Kirk Wilder is the manager of the Boonville Airport, earning a whopping \$1 per year, for which he was actually paid once. "I've got it framed on the hangar wall," he joked.

The Boonville airport is a public airport, owned by the Anderson Valley Community Services District. "It used to be a county airport," Wilder explained, "and people there kept it from getting closed down back in the 1980s. It exists through volunteer effort. I came up today in the Cessna 182, which is in the German colors, the black and the orange and red. A voung man who I taught to fly

drove it in today. I had my Uber-Lvft pilot today," Wilder mused.

Local Housing Allocation program. It currently has funds allocated for three years, so the city's loan program can assist as many Willits residents as possible. Although some requirements must be met, the program is expected to help numerous residents throughout the city live in their homes for as long as possible.

The program is a collaborative effort run by Community Development Director Dusty Duley, Building Official Davey Bowles, and Code Compliance Officer Phil Davidson from the City of Willits, and third-party consultants Sandy O'Ferrall with Laco. Jeff Lucas, and Deborah Swartz with Community Development Services.

Duley clarified that the program's mission is to preserve the quality of the town's existing housing stock, while preventing further deterioration and damage, and expanding housing options for all income groups within Willits. The goal is to support residents financially, Duley said, "getting the money to the right people so they can live in their homes for a long time." The team is committed to providing financial support to ensure Willits residents are not displaced due to housing renovation costs.

To be eligible to apply, you must be an existing homeowner and occupy the home undergoing rehabilitation as your primary residence. It must be a single-family or manufactured home, and you must be able to provide the necessary documentation included in the application and information packets.

There is a gross annual income limit of 120% of the area median income, and due to limited funds, there will be an application scoring process to decide who will receive the loan based on income, repair urgency, and length of home ownership during each round. The loan is specifically designed to aid long-time Willits residents and residents whose homes need some tender loving care and repairs.

Restrictions to the loan also apply, and eligible work includes foundational, structural, electrical, mechanical, plumbing, windows, flooring, painting, insulation, and termite repairs, all disclosed in the application, "Sorry everyone, no pools." All repairs covered under the loan must be approved by the city with a home inspection, before choosing a contractor and proceeding with the loan

You can pick up applications at Willits City Hall, and the window for submitting applications begins Monday, June 24 and closes on Monday, August 5. Applications will be reviewed based on the scoring details after the application submission window closes on August 5.

To submit your application to City Hall for consideration of the loan, you must also make an in-person application intake appointment to go over all details of your paperwork and begin the customizable process of the loan, meaning you may not drop off or mail in your application. All applications must be submitted in-person. This appointment can be scheduled with Office Assistant Amber Ojeda; contact her via phone at (707) 459-7112 or via email at aojeda@

A contractor application is also available for local contractors interested in being on the approved loan list. The application will be available at Willits City Hall and can be filled out anytime. Contractors must be pre-approved by the city before they can be selected by homeowners for repairs; however, if a contractor you'd like to do work on your home has not yet been added to the list, they can be added at any time during the early stages of the loan process by filling out the application and meeting city

Receiving the loan in the first round is not guaranteed. However, the next round of loans is scheduled to open in early 2025 to continue to assist as many people as possible. For those seeking more information, please visit City Hall to obtain information packets and applications, then make an intake appointment. Tailored to meet your housing repair needs, the city aims to use loans to provide financial assistance in a way that best fits you. Visit City Hall so you can help the city help you.



involves the upgrade and replacement of equipment and will require that the substation to be deenergized to ensure the safety of PG&E employees conducting work."

Customers who will lose power include all served by the substation, including customers in the City of Willits, the Little Lake Valley, north and south of Willits, Brooktrails and other communities up Sherwood Road, and other areas in the Willits substation grid. See PG&E's outage map at the end of this article that shows areas that are planned to lose

According to PG&E "all customers that will be impacted by the outage have been notified," but according to comments by locals and comments on social media about the June 6 announcement, if customers received any notice, it was about the earlier shutdown planned for May 11, then cancelled on May 8, and not this new June 22

"Beginning in late May," the PR states, "PG&E began notifying customers impacted by the planned outage by phone, text and email to ensure that they could plan accordingly. PG&E also notified critical customers in advance, including hospitals and first responders, to ensure the proper resources were in place to support their

"This safety work was originally scheduled for May," the PR continued, "but with feedback and input from stakeholders, PG&E was able to reschedule the work and planned outage to ensure ample notification to critical customers."



MLT to manage conservation easements on Big River, Salmon Creek forestlands

After more than two years working together, The Conservation Fund and the Mendocino Land Trust are pleased to announce that TCF has conveyed two conservation easements of forestland along the Big River and Salmon Creek in Mendocino County to MLT. The two conservation easements, 11,707 acres along Big River (west and south of Willits), and 4,389 acres along Salmon Creek, comprise more than 16,000 acres.

"MLT is delighted to be able to take over the perpetual role of monitoring and enforcing the conservation easements on these two stunning and large acreages," said Conrad Kramer, MLT's executive director. "It is always a pleasure to work with our friends at The Conservation Fund, and we are particularly pleased to be involved with these acreages that benefit our local economy, our local wildlife, and our owl, coho salmon, and steelhead trout by increasing global climate."

"Land conservation efforts such as this benefit our communities as much as they benefit wildlife," said Holly Newberger, program manager at TCF. "Clean water is something we all need – and the result of this work will help ensure the people, animals and plants around Mendocino County can thrive together well into the future. As the local expert and as a mission-driven organization, MLT is the ideal caretaker for this property. We at TCF couldn't have asked for a better outcome."

These forests are richly productive and particularly important to the conservation of the endangered coho salmon, steelhead trout, and northern spotted owl. The Big River Forest is in the middle portion of the Big River Watershed and contains tributaries, including the Little North Fork, Two Log Creek, and Laguna Creek as well as a central portion of the main stem of the Big River. The Big River Forest is 11,707 acres and the Salmon Creek Forest is 4.389 acres.

The Salmon Creek Forest is located three miles southeast of the town of Albion along the mainstream of Salmon Creek and is situated between Albion Ridge and Navarro Ridge Roads

Both of these conservation easements and their land are high-priority watersheds for anadromous salmonids as identified in California's "Recovery Strategy for California Coho Salmon."

The combined forests include 34 miles of fish bearing streams, 41 miles of perennial streams, associated riparian




Forest Management Plans have been updated and prepared for both forests. The forests will continue to be managed as working forests that will maintain and enhance habitat conditions for the northern spotted structural diversity, high canopy closure, late seral forest characteristics, and the maturity of the riparian forests that promote and restore coldwater fisheries.

The Mendocino Land Trust will be responsible for monitoring activities on the properties, ensuring that the conservation easement provisions are followed and that forest management is consistent with the Forest Management Plans.

Both properties were acquired in November 2006 by TCF with the support of the State Coastal Conservancy, Wildlife Conservation Board, State Water Board, and the David and Lucile Packard Foundation. The Conservation Fund will continue to own and manage the properties.

He went on to tell about the young pilot, who he's been montoring since the kid was 10, when he asked if he could take a photo of Wilder's airplane: "The young man who is flying it is currently rated for commercial and instrument, and in a couple weeks, he'll be taking his check ride and he'll be a certified flight instructor.

"He knew from age 5 that he wanted to be a pilot," said Wilder. "I've been assisting him to realize his dream. His name is Zhidao. I encountered him in Ukiah with his camera. He asked politely if he could photograph my Piper PA-12. I showed him the airplane and let him sit in it. I flew back to Boonville thinking I'd never see him again.

"I flew there the following year and there he was with his camera, waiting for me. I took him up and let him fly the airplane and he was remarkable from day one. We got him a \$10.000 scholarship from the club in 2020. The program for which he accepted the scholarship is a 12-month course. He completed it in 35 days and got his license."

Bob Gutteridge built his own kit plane which lives at the Santa Rosa Charles M. Schulz Airport. "I've been flying for about 40 years," he explained. "I put this airplane together. It's a Jabiru 230. This has a 100-foot [area] wing. The plane is made of fiberglass. I had to do the assembly work to get the wings bolted on. The hinges for the flaps have to be glued on. Putting the windshield in is the hardest part." Gutteridge has flown the plane as far as Alaska. He enjoys sightseeing and doesn't care if his airplane will go fast.

Pilots landed for the get-together throughout the day, enjoyed some cheeseburgers and the fellowship of others with similar knowledge and interests.



To get to a less painful life for this young puppy still so full of life and love, we are looking at more appointments, possibly another surgery, and even physical therapy. Her vet costs are adding up quickly. While we help Lucy focus on the next six


