Brooktrails board to pay 36% of wastewater repair

At the Tuesday evening, November 12, Brooktrails Township Community Services District meeting, the full Board of Directors was in attendance. There was one item listed on the Consent Calendar: The Review and Approval of Accounts Payable for on or about November 13, 2024. The Board unanimously approved the amount of \$262,036.60.

There was one item listed on the agenda for the evening: Consideration of Resolution 2024-15 Contributing a Thirty-Six Percent (36%) Cost Share toward the City of Willits Wastewater Clarifier Capital Repair Project.

Background information provided in the board packet: "The City of Willits' City Council has approved a project to repair a 13-year old wastewater treatment plant clarifier due to drive motor deterioration and potential failure of the rake arm. On Sunday, October 20, three days before the City Council meeting where this item was approved, Brooktrails District Counsel was notified by the City

Willits man arrested for sex abuse of minors

On November 21 – November 17, 2024 at approximately 4:01 pm, deputies from the Mendocino County Sheriff's Office were dispatched to the 24000 block of Clover Circle in Willits, to contact an adult female, regarding a possible sexual assault committed against her two daughters.

During the initial interview, deputies determined multiple sexual assaults had occurred over the course of 10 years involving two victims, and the investigation was turned over to the Mendocino County Sheriff's Office Investigations Bureau.

The suspect in this case was identified as Matthew Adams, 38, of Willits, who was currently out of the immediate area.

During the investigation, detectives interviewed both victims, one juvenile girl aged 12 and one adult woman, now 19, and developed probable cause to author a search warrant for Adams' residence.

Detectives learned Adams was scheduled

While the meat of the meal is usually cooked out at Parlin Fork Conservation Camp, which has the capacity to cook the 40 turkeys and quantity-sized other dishes, their kitchen burned down just a few days before preparations were ready to start.

In a scramble for a solution and during her first Willits Thanksgiving event in her new role, Willits Community

Services and Food Bank Executive Director Kim Tippit put out the call for help for prepping and cooking the massive meal.

What does a meal look like for 800 people? Well it includes 800 pounds of turkey, 300 pounds of ham, 500 pounds of potatoes, 220 boxes of stuffing, 300 pounds of yams, 20 pounds of turkey gravy mix, 500 pounds of butter, 115 pies, 42 cans of mushroom soup, 384 cans of string beans, 20 gallons of milk, 84 cans of fried onions, 24 cans of evaporated milk, 100 pounds of flour, 1 pound of pepper, 1 pound of cinnamon, 1 pound of poultry seasoning, 4 pounds of salt, 20 pounds of sugar, 40 pounds of brown sugar, 100 cans of pumpkin, and 20 cans of whipped cream, to start.

Arora Chavez, the executive director of Student Programs, led the workshop and presentation on district-wide information: Ethnic Studies Workshop and CAASP and ELPAC Performance Analysis.

It began with unrelenting chest pain at 1 am, Tuesday November 5. I called 911 and was put in touch with the Willits Fire Department. The ambulance was busy with a wreck north of Willits. Fire Department "command vehicles" finished with the accident, were sent to my front door. With Jeff Donaldson of Willits Fire I was given a nice ride to Howard Emergency. We chatted, which helped keep my thoughts off of the pain. At the hospital Eric Alvarez of Willits Fire helped get me situated and in the ER. Thanks guys for

Thanks to all the attention and pain-reducing help at the Howard Emergency Department, aka ED. This includes Ali Pandamouz, M.D., William Gonser M.D., and very competent nurses on duty. With an IV drip in each arm the pain level went down from a 7 to around 2. Dr. Pandamouz arranged for a transfer to Adventist Health in St. Helena. He diagnosed my heart attack as a "NSTEMI," the less serious type.

At 6:30 am, REACH helicopter from Lake County arrived for the St. Helena trip. They were working fast due to a cloud cover expected in St. Helena. With REACH was nurse August, EMT Tyler, and pilot Katie. I was quickly slid in the helicopter right next to pilot Katie who greeted me with a warm smile of confidence. IV drips still working, we were off to the hospital. Katie gave me a smooth 30 minute ride into a rising cloud cover with sunrise on the horizon. Thanks Katie, August, and Tyler.

This was not my first time at St. Helena hospital. That was 83 years ago in 1941 where I was born. My parents, migrant workers from West Virginia, were in the St. Helena area. With WWII we went back to the farm in WV.

Debra Hobbs, M.D. and staff at St. Helena gave me nonstop attention. This included an angiography and 2 stents. A very busy hospital. Thanks to everyone at SH for giving me the timely emergency medical help that I needed.



'Magic and Mentalism'

Robert Goleman performs acts of wonder and amazement at sold out WCT show on Saturday

"Do You Believe in Magic?" asks the song from the Lovin' Spoonful in 1965. After last Saturday's performance by Robert Goleman at the Willits Community Theatre, there are several more people who will probably say "yes!" A full house of 74 amazed theatergoers, sat agape at the many feats of almost incomprehensible legerdemain and mentalism that Goleman performed for the grateful crowd.

Goleman began with a question: "What is magic?" His answer: "simultaneous belief and disbelief," Goleman expounded. "I explain that in my show – that contradiction between the rational and the emotional. You know it's a trick, but you allow yourself to believe. And it's fun. Some

people don't like to be fooled, but most do." The crowd at the theater was amongst the group that loves to be fooled, and the tricks were performed with such dexterity and flair that the people were left scratching their

heads in wonder at how it could not be a supernatural feat occurring before their eyes. Goleman opened the show with a couple of the expected magic tricks, three uneven lengths of rope that magically became the same measure, two strings that tied and untied themselves, and an endless string of scarves that seemed to appear out of thin air. The

magic tricks were the warm up for the remainder of the two-hour show which consisted of Goleman's deftly performed and gasp-inducing feats of mentalism involving cards, pages of books, and other devices, from which he recited words, phrases and numbers that he could not see and could not have memorized, leaving everyone in the room asking, "how did he do that?" Goleman has been practicing magic and mentalism since he was a little boy. "I've been

doing magic for about 50 years, since I was about 7 years old, when I got my first magic kit," Goleman recounted. "My mom bought it for me at the emporium in San Francisco. I worked with cups and balls for a long time. The first kit that I had actually came with a little top hat which you could make a rabbit appear in, a little plastic rabbit. I forced my family to be bored for hours with my magic. I never stopped. I always dabbled in magic.





to return to the Willits area during the the Mendocino County Jail where he was afternoon of November 20, 2024, and they awaited his arrival. At this time, detectives believed Adams was aware that a report had been made, and he might attempt to avoid law enforcement. With the assistance of the victims' mother, Adams was located within the City of Willits.

Ultimately, Adams was placed under arrest for two counts of 288.5(a) PC (Continuous Sexual Abuse of a Minor).

Adams was subsequently booked into

to be held in lieu of \$750,000 bail.

Based on the circumstances of this investigation, Investigators believe there may be additional victims of abuse perpetrated by Adams, and the investigation is ongoing. in. I was working at Fog City Diner at the time. At the time, it was one of the best restaurants in the city and had a year's waiting list to get in. I started doing magic for my customers, which helped my tips and made me realize that I needed to keep doing it. Most people would see me doing magic at the next table and request that I come over and do it at their table.

"When I moved back to Fort Bragg," continued Goleman, "I had been with the Gloriana Opera Company right out of high school and did a couple of Gilbert and Sullivan operettas, 'lolanthe' and 'Pirates of Penzance. People caught wind of my doing magic in Fort Bragg. They were doing a concert series. They asked me if I would do a show. The first half was me singing and doing a set of music and then doing a set of magic. The second half of the show was stage magic. We formed a little troupe. We called ourselves The Fabulous Blendos. Blendo is a famous magic trick, where you have a bunch of different colored silks that turn into one big silk, using those colors. We ended up making a huge two-hour stage show with a band. We had huge box illusions and it was amazing.

Many Willits residents will remember Goleman from the Willits Farmers Market at which he had a booth selling some tasty pastries and desserts, which he gave up to follow his dream of performing magic and mentalism.

The performance was interactive, utilizing people from the audience who were not in on his act, to read passages from books, pick cards, roll dice, and several other pieces of business necessary to setting up the "mind-reading." The most eager were the youngest audience members who delighted in having their minds expanded and their disbelief suspended.



Famed political activist and longtime Willits resident Sally Gearhart is featured in a documentary film "Sally!" directed by Deborah Craig and showing at the Willits Community Theatre on Sunday, December 1 at 2 pm. Known for her warm wit and fierce advocacy, Gearhart became an inspiration in the women's rights and gay rights movement in the 1970s.

The film traces her early roots in Virginia to her teaching in Texas, and ultimately to her major role in Bay Area politics as a lesbian activist, teacher and writer alongside Iuminaries like former San Francisco Mayor

Harvey Milk.

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

On Tuesday, October Facilities and its 2020 Amendment 22, 2024, a City of Willits staff member to the Agreement are in place, which attended the district's regular board meeting to notify the general manager the city for demanding that Brooktrails of the city's next day agenda item. The city staff report advised that there was a "Brooktrails' agreed obligation to contribute 36-percent toward the cost."

Clearly, there was a breakdown in communication as there was not an occasion for the district and its engineer or staff to review the proposal that was moved forward for City Council approval as Brooktrails' review was not solicited prior to the recommended action being agendized. Neither was the item included in the last received "quarterly" wastewater report that the Willits City Manager provided to the District in January and April 2024. Therefore, there has not been an agreed obligation for Brooktrails to pay a portion of this project as stated in the city's staff report.

There is a cost share discussion that's based on relevant terms identified by Brooktrails staff in the Agreement by City of Willits for Disposal of Sewage from Brooktrails Resort Improvement District and its second through fourth amendments to the Agreement between the City of Willits and Brooktrails Township Community Services District.

The stated terms are: "City Control of Improvements and District Pre-Approval Requirement. Plan Review by District. The Board of Directors of the District, with the advice of its engineers, shall have the right to review, make suggestions and approve for their adequacy, plans, specifications and cost estimates prior to their approval by the City Council of the City, provided, however, that its approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.

Human remains found near Piercy 12 years ago IDed

On October 30, 2012 at 7 am during the morning shift briefing, Mendocino County Sheriff's Office Dispatch advised then-Sergeant Matt Kendall that human remains had been discovered, buried in a shallow grave in the Piercy area, near the Eel River and the Mendocino / Humboldt

Detectives with the Mendocino County Sheriff's Investigations Bureau responded to the 83000 block of Highway 271 in Piercy, and were provided with a plastic bag containing human foot bones. Photographs taken by the reporting party were also provided to investigators at this time.

MCSO detectives utilized kayaks and paddled approximately 1/4 mile to the location, where the remains had been discovered.

Forensic anthropologists from California State University in Chico were requested for the excavation / preservation of the buried skeletal remains.

At the conclusion of the excavation, the forensic anthropology team unearthed human skeletal remains, which were absent the head. It appeared the remains located within the shallow grave had been there for an extended time, and the partial articles of clothing collected suggested 1980s

Due to the surrounding circumstances this investigation was labeled as a "John Doe" homicide.

An investigation was launched, and multiple attempts to identify the remains of the buried skeletal remains were made, but were ultimately unsuccessful.

In spring 2024, the Mendocino County Sheriff's Office sent forensic evidence to Othram Technology in The Woodlands, Texas. At Othram's laboratory, scientists successfully developed a DNA extract from the forensic evidence and used Forensic-Grade Genome Sequencing® to build a comprehensive DNA profile for the unknown man. Othram's in-house forensic genetic genealogy team then used this profile to conduct genealogy research, ultimately providing new investigative leads to law enforcement. The investigative leads presented genealogical findings for a Warren

After receiving this information, Investigators learned that "Warren Hawkins" had been reported missing by his sister (Paula Hawkins) to the Cowlitz County Sheriff's Office in Washington. Paula provided a DNA reference sample to the Cowlitz County Sheriff's Office, which was provided to Othram Technology and later used for his identification. An additional DNA sample was obtained from Paula in 2024 by the Gresham Police Department in Oregon.

The last reported sighting of Hawkins was in July of 1986 when his now-deceased mother dropped off 21-year-old Hawkins and another unknown male at a bus station.

Because of the hard work and dedication of the above listed agencies, the remains of Warren David Hawkins can now be returned to his family.

This is still an active and ongoing homicide investigation with the Mendocino County Sheriff's Office. and anyone with information related to this case is requested to call the Sheriff's Office Dispatch Center at 707-463-4086

day after Thanksgiving. From 6 to 7 am, everything is 40 percent off, only in the Gardener's Pantry; 7 to 9 am, everything is 30 percent off; 9 am to 12 pm, everything is 20 percent off."

The trees usually sell out well before Christmas, so make sure to head in early. "Our trees start in the low-tomid \$30s, up to around \$100 for the larger trees, 8-to-10 footers," explained Hosford. "We sell the most of the 10-to-12 footers. Please make sure your ceiling is tall enough. We've been doing the Christmas trees since I was a little kid. It was always one of my favorite things to do in the holidays because I got to work outside and sometimes there would be snow on the trees.

"We ship these down from Oregon," Hosford said. "They're cut and we bring them right down here, so they are very fresh. We keep them moist. The rain sort of helped this year. We cut the bottoms off, drill a hole in the bottom, and we put them on stands in a pool of water. The low emperatures and keeping them exposed to water keeps them as fresh as possible. Douglas firs and Noble firs are the two most popular types of trees we sell. We have a couple other varieties as well. We have some live trees as well, only about five or six, but those are expensive, in the couple hundred range.

Jaime Wilkes, vice-president of Sparetime, helped create the Gardener's Pantry and Winter Wonderland. "We really wanted to create a destination place for people to come and pick out the perfect Christmas tree and have some hot cocoa and enjoy a family evening," said Wilkes. "We have wonderful Christmas gifts at the Gardener's Pantry After today, we'll have all the trees available until they're sold. We'll have hot cocoa and apple cider every night. The normal store hours are Monday through Saturday, 9 am to 5 pm. We're open on Sundays for the holidays, 10

"We have a craft area for kids where they can make their own Christmas ornaments." Wilkes said. "We take the bottoms off of all the Christmas trees and they can be used for the kids to make their own ornaments. This will also be here until all the trees are gone. It's a free activity for the kids to do while their parents are shopping for Christmas trees. We also have a little station where they can write a letter to Santa. The parents just write their address or email on the back so we can make sure we send it to them after they leave."


